Measure No: 111

Measure Designation: Referred to the People by the Legislative Assembly

Caption: Amends Constitution: State must ensure affordable healthcare access, balanced against requirement to fund schools, other essential services

Result of Yes: "Yes" vote requires state to ensure affordable healthcare access. State must balance healthcare funding against funding for schools, other essential services; courts must respect balance.

Result of No: "No" vote retains current law. The constitution does not require the state to ensure access to affordable health care; state provides some healthcare access.

Summary: Amends Constitution. Current state law outlines the general requirements for health insurance policies and provides health care for low income and disabled residents who meet eligibility requirements. Amends the Oregon Constitution to establish health care as a fundamental right; obligates the state to provide Oregon residents "access to cost-effective, clinically appropriate and affordable health care." Amendment requires the state to balance that obligation against the public interest in funding public schools and other essential public services. If the state is sued to enforce the amendment, the court may not order a remedy that interferes with the state's requirement to balance healthcare funding against funding for public schools and other essential public services.

Financial Impact: The financial impact to state and local expenditure and revenue is indeterminate. The measure does not require additional state government revenues or expenditures. The impact of the measure will depend on future legislative action to establish additional health benefits and determine how they will be paid for.

Measure No: 112

Measure Designation: Referred to the People by the Legislative Assembly

Caption: Amends Constitution: Removes language allowing slavery and involuntary servitude as punishment for crime

Result of Yes: "Yes" vote amends constitution to remove language allowing slavery and involuntary servitude as punishment for crime; allows programs to be ordered as part of sentencing.

Result of No: "No" vote retains current language that generally prohibits slavery and involuntary servitude but allows slavery and involuntary servitude as punishment for crime.

Summary: Amends Constitution. Article I, section 34 of the Oregon Constitution currently prohibits slavery and involuntary servitude but allows an exception to that prohibition as a punishment for crime. Measure removes language that allows slavery and involuntary servitude as a punishment for crime. Under measure, a court or probation or parole agency is allowed to order a person convicted of a crime to engage in education, counseling, treatment, community service, or other alternatives to incarceration, as part of sentencing for the crime. Ordered programs must be in line with programs that historically, or in the future, have been in place to provide for accountability, reformation, protection of society, or rehabilitation. Effect on current constitutional provisions requiring inmate work programs unclear.

Financial Impact: The financial impact to state and local expenditures and revenues is indeterminate. The measure removes language allowing slavery and involuntary servitude as a punishment for a crime. The measure does not require additional state government revenues or expenditures however the impact of the measure will depend on potential legal action or changes to inmate work programs.

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Statewide Nonpartisan

Measure No: 113

Measure Designation: Proposed by Initiative Petition

Caption: Amends Constitution: Legislators with ten unexcused absences from floor sessions disqualified from holding next term of office

Result of Yes: "Yes" vote disqualifies legislators with ten unexcused absences from legislative floor sessions from holding office as legislator for term following current term of office.

Result of No: "No" vote retains existing law. Absent legislators may be punished by legislative chamber (potentially expelled by supermajority); present legislators have legal authority to compel attendance.

Summary: Amends Oregon Constitution to add language prescribing consequences for unexcused absences by legislators from floor sessions. Currently, Senators and Representatives may be "punished" or, by the concurrence of two-thirds of the Senator's or Representative's chamber, "expelled" for "disorderly behavior," but law does not define "disorderly behavior." Additionally, absent legislators may be "compelled" to attend legislative floor sessions, but current law does not specify consequences for unexcused absences. Measure specifies that "disorderly behavior" includes legislator's failure to attend ten or more legislative floor sessions during a regular or special legislative session without permission or excuse. Under measure, legislator who engages in "disorderly behavior" through unexcused absences is disqualified from serving as a Senator or Representative for the term following the end of the legislator's current term.

Financial Impact: This measure will have no financial effect on either state or local government expenditures or revenues.

Measure No: 114

Measure Designation: Proposed by Initiative Petition

Caption: Requires permit to acquire firearms; police maintain permit/firearm database; criminally prohibits certain ammunition magazines

Result of Yes: "Yes" vote requires background check, safety training, fee for permit to acquire firearms; state police maintain new permit/ firearm database; criminally prohibits certain magazines; exceptions.

Result of No: "No" vote retains current law: seller/ transferor must request criminal background check; permit, safety course not required; no magazine capacity restrictions.

Summary: Oregon law currently allows persons over age 18 to acquire firearms (federal law requires age 21 for some handgun purchases), seller/ transferor must request criminal background check. Measure requires permit from local law enforcement to acquire firearm; person must pay fee, submit photo ID, fingerprints, complete approved safety training, pass criminal background check, not be prohibited from possessing firearms; officer may deny permit to person believed danger to self or others. Permit issued within 30 days, valid 5 years. Permit denials appealable. Must present permit, pass background check to acquire firearm. State Police creates/ maintains permit/ firearm database. Magazines over 10 rounds, or readily modifiable to exceed 10 rounds, prohibited; exception for current owners /inheritors. Exceptions for law enforcement, armed forces. Criminal penalties. Other provisions.

Financial Impact: The intent of the measure is for revenues from permits to cover administrative costs. Cost estimates related to the measure were received from state and local government. However, there is uncertainty in the assumptions regarding the estimates made, including the projections of the number of permit applications, the revenue associated with those permits and other related costs. There is also uncertainty in potential cost savings to state and local government expenditures due to an expected decrease in firearm related injuries and death. Therefore, the financial impact of Measure 114 for state and local governments is indeterminate.

Measure No: 10-191

Caption: Concerning psilocybin (hallucinogenic mushrooms)-related businesses in unincorporated Douglas County.

Question: Shall psilocybin-related businesses be allowed in unincorporated areas (outside city limits) of Douglas County?

Summary: Douglas County adopted an ordinance (Ordinance No. 2022-07-01) referring to the voters of the county the question whether to allow psilocybin-related businesses (psilocybin product manufacturers, psilocybin services centers, and any combination thereof) in unincorporated areas (outside city limits) of Douglas County. This ballot measure asks you to answer that question. A "yes" vote allows psilocybin-related businesses. A "no" vote prohibits psilocybin-related businesses. The ordinance and this ballot measure do not affect whether psilocybin-related businesses will be allowed inside the city limits of any city in the county -- that decision will be up to the city council and voters of each city.

Caption: Advisory Question Concerning Restoring Full Services at Roseburg VA Hospital

Question: Do you believe that full services should be restored at the Roseburg VA Hospital?

Summary: The Douglas County Board of Commissioners has placed this advisory question on the ballot to determine voter attitudes on the question of whether full services should be restored at the Roseburg VA Hospital.

A yes vote means that you believe that full services should be restored at the Roseburg VA Hospital.

A no vote means that you believe that full services should not be restored at the Roseburg VA Hospital.

Measure No: 10-200

Caption: Prohibits the establishment of psilocybin-related businesses for two years.

Question: Shall electors prohibit the establishment of psilocybin-related business for two-years within the City of Reedsport?

Summary: The Oregon Health Authority has not completed the rulemaking process for implementing the state's psilocybin regulatory program, and the City Council is uncertain how the manufacture, delivery and administration of psilocybin at licensed facilities will operate within the city. ORS 475A.718 provides that a city council may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the electors of the city prohibiting the establishment of state licensed psilocybin product manufacturers and/or psilocybin service centers in the city. The City Council believes that prohibiting psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the city's jurisdictional boundaries to enable the adoption of the state's psilocybin licensing and regulatory program and to allow the city to adopt reasonable time, place, and manner regulations on the operation of psilocybin facilities is in the best interest of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens.

A "Yes" vote will establish a two-year moratorium (ban) on the establishment of psilocybin-related businesses within Reedsport.

A "No" vote will allow the establishment of psilocybin-related businesses to operate with in Reedsport.

A "no" vote prohibits psilocybin-related businesses inside the area of jurisdiction of the City of Riddle.

Summary: State law allows for the manufacturing, transportation, delivery, sale, and purchase of psilocybin, the psychedelic drug found in certain mushrooms. State law provides that a local government may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of licensed psilocybin product manufacturers and/or psilocybin service centers.

The Sutherlin City Council adopted an ordinance prohibiting the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service center operators within the City for a period of two years, which was referred to the voters per state law.

The two-year prohibition is intended to provide additional time for the City to enact reasonable time, place, and manner restrictions on licensed facilities.

Approval of this measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service center operators within the City of Sutherlin until December 31, 2024.

Caption: Prohibits Psilocybin-Related Businesses within the City of Winston, Oregon

Question: Shall the City of Winston prohibit psilocybin-related businesses in Winston?

Summary: State law allows for the manufacture, distribution and possession of psilocybin and psilocin. State law provides that a city council may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of any of the registered or licensed activities. If adopted by the voters, this measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin product manufactures and/or psilocybin service center operators within the City of Winston.

North Douglas County Fire and EMS

Measure No: 10-199

Caption: Fire & Emergency Medical Service Five Year Operating levy

Question: Shall a 5-year extension of the \$0.99 per thousand local option tax for Fire and Ambulance operatins be approved?

Summary: Currently North Douglas County Fire and EMS can not replace old worn Fire Trucks and equipment without an operating levy. The operating levy would allow us to replace three ambulances and one fire engine while allowing us to lower our annual vehicle maintenance costs. The \$0.99 per thousand tax raised from this measure would be in effect from July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2028. The proposed rate will raise approximately \$356,248 in 2023/2024, \$366,935 in 2024/2025, \$377,943 in 2025/2026, \$389,281 in 2026/2027 and \$400,959 in 2027/2028 for a total of \$1,891,366. It would be restricted to general fund expenses. The estimated costs for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of the estimate. The passage of this measure will not increase taxes. It will keep them at the same level as the last 15 years.
